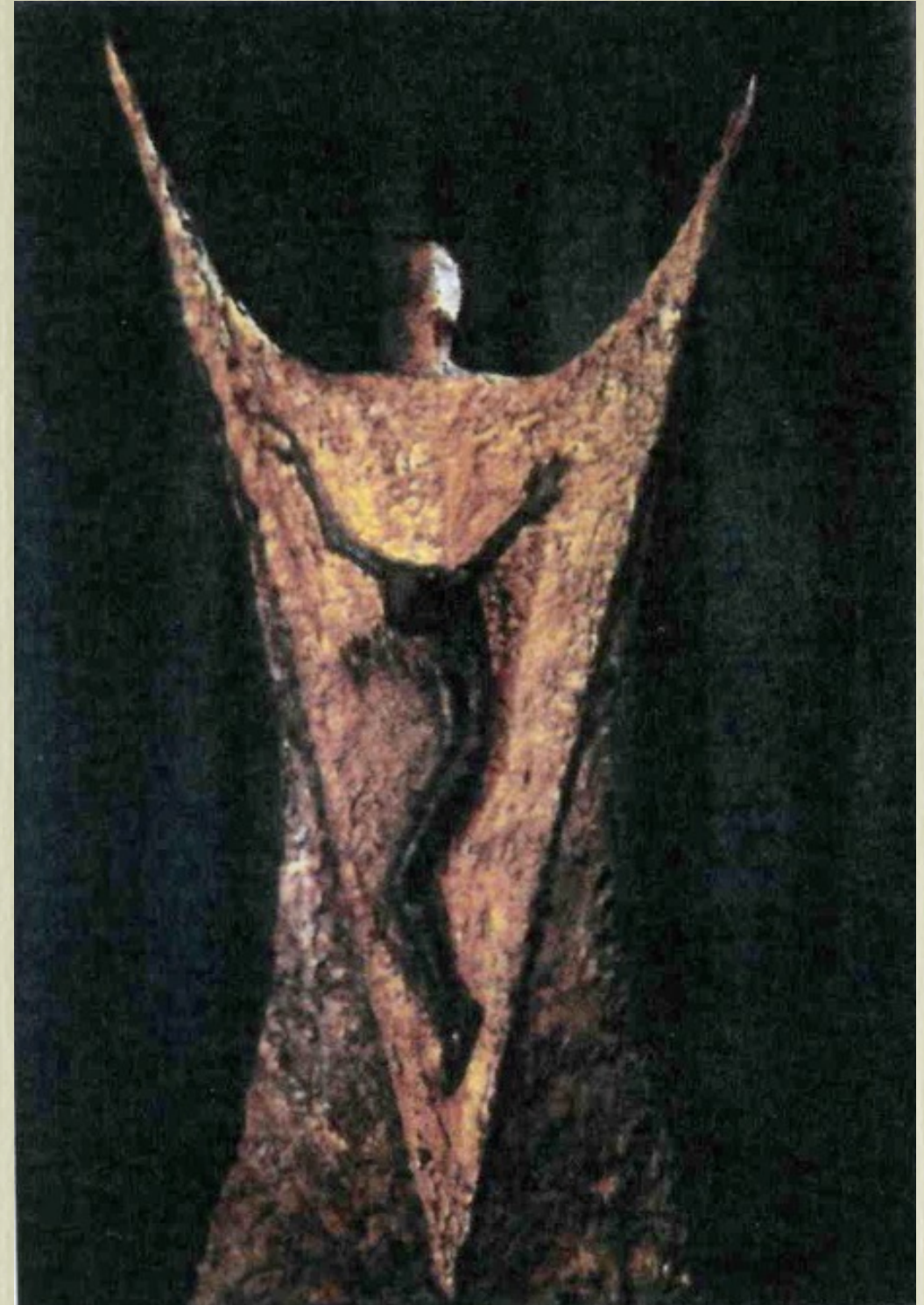
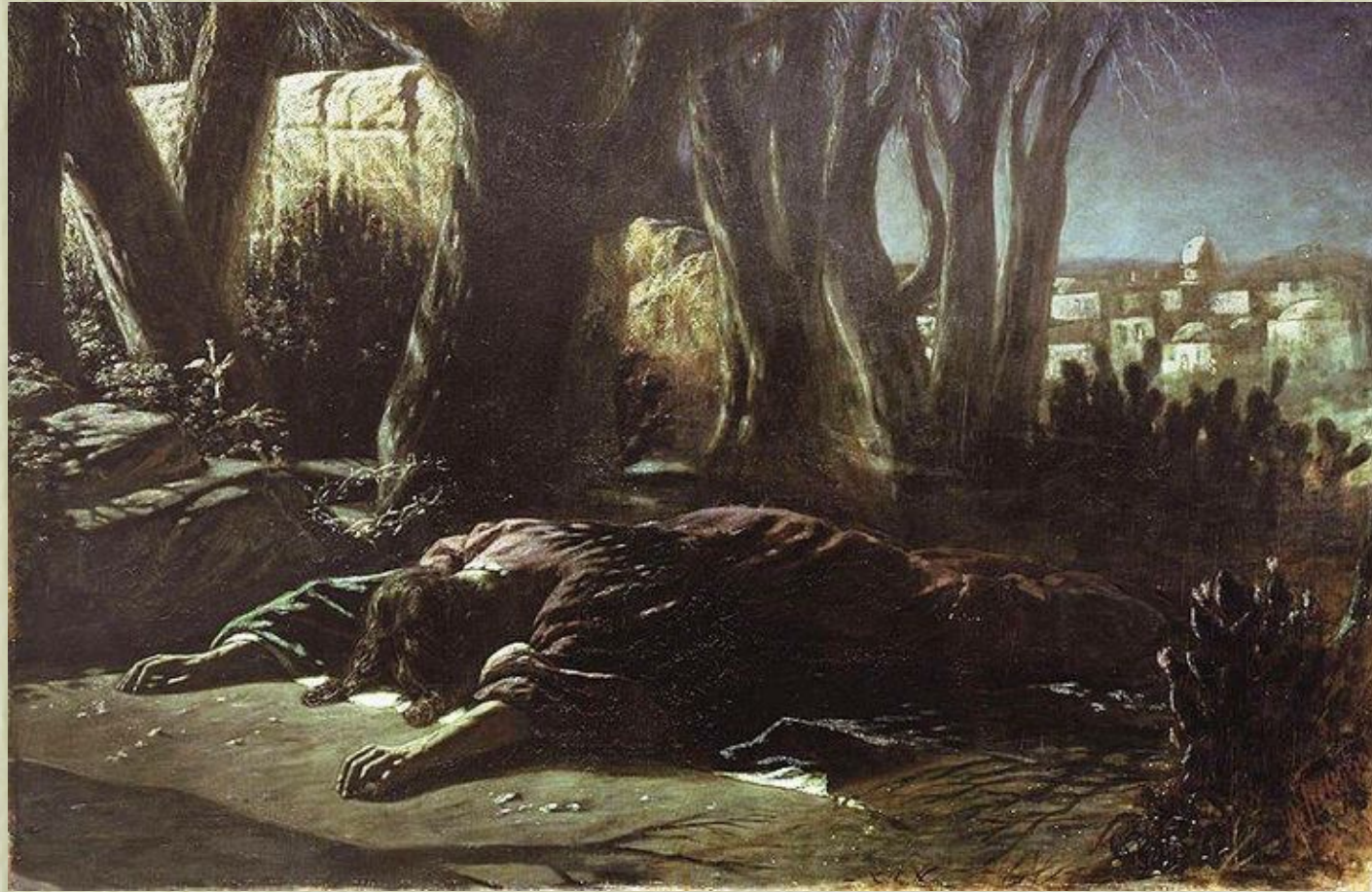

Part I . Jesus faces his bitter struggle alone

Part II. Jesus' Dying

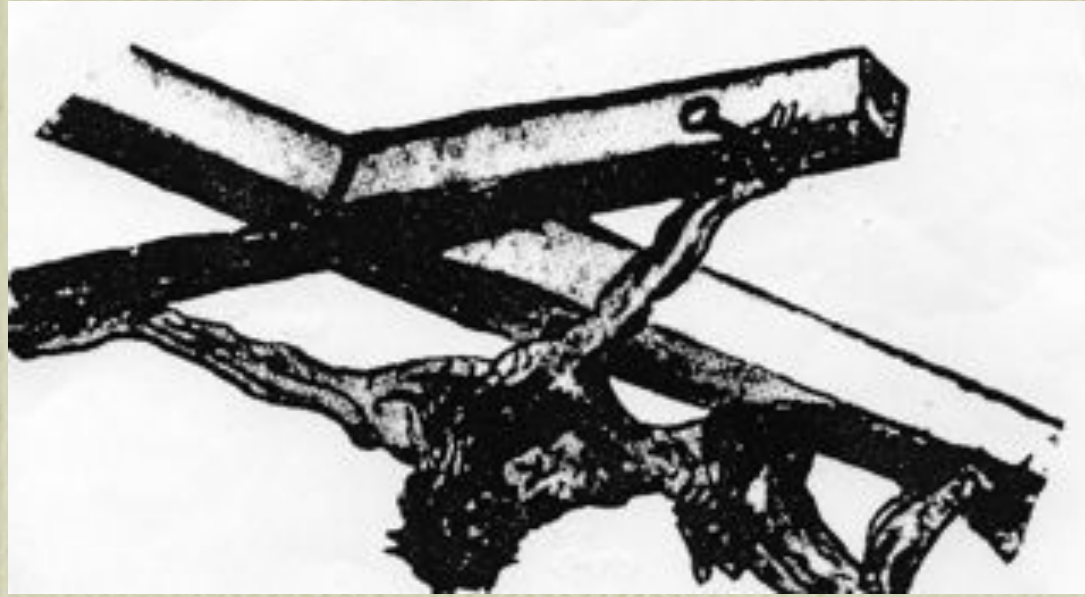

Jesus shows us that when people behave badly towards us, we do not have to respond in the same way. 'Love one another', he said, 'just as I have loved you'(John 15:12).

Jesus showed us how to respond in love even in the worst situations.

It is this which makes his message so convincing. It is this which draws us to follow him.

We needed to see Jesus loving on the cross, not because God demanded a crucifixion, but because nothing less could convince us that in our suffering we, like Jesus, are surrounded by the unconditional and persistent love of God.

Suffering, even when unjustly inflicted, does not have to stop our loving.

If, in our human way, we are to imagine God responding to the crucifixion, we should imagine God weeping, as Jesus wept over the city (Luke 19:41).

This is God's reaction to all the terrible injustices that we humans inflict on each other by our sinful rejection of his loving inspiration.

- God cannot pretend that things are other than as they really are.
- Sin, however, cannot change the truth that God is love.
- This love, demonstrated in the way Jesus died, is the source of all our hope.
- If we believe it, we may dare the journey out of sin. If enough people believe it, there is still hope of realising Jesus' dream of God's will being done on earth as in heaven.
